# 2015 Troop 86 Eagle Scouts

#### Aryzona M.

Aryzona became Troop 86's first deaf Eagle Scout in 2015. He had his Eagle Scout Board of Review on January 27, 2015. Aryzona completed his Eagle Scout Service Project at the Deaf Culture Center in 2014. He utilized many a number of scouts and scouters on this landscaping project which greatly benefited the Center. Aryzona became the 1st deaf Eagle Scout in the Heart of America Council in 28 years! Aryzona had his Court of Honor at Ernie Miller Nature Center on August 15, 2015.

#### Michael N.

Michael earned his Eagle Scout Award on February 7, 2015. Last summer Michael completed his Eagle Project at Olathe Northwest High School, where he oversaw the construction of a spirit wear facility for needy students. Michael chose to have his Eagle Award ceremony at Camp Naish, where he has been on staff for several years. Michael in now a proud member of the US Army where he is in Basic Training at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri.

#### Mitchell S.

Mitchell became Troop 86's 200th Eagle Scout on March 22, 2015! Mitch oversaw a very unique Eagle Scout Project last summer at Grace United Methodist Church, our Charter Organization. The project consisted of burying a 'Time Capsule' containing historical documents for the church. Some of the valuable documents were over 100 years old. A monument with an identifying plaque was placed adjacent to the time capsule. At this time, Mitch is planning his Court of Honor for some time in October.

#### Zachary S.

Zachary successfully completed his Eagle Scout Board of Review on March 31, 2015. Zachary has really stepped up and demonstrated his advance leadership skills in the past year. He completed his Eagle Scout Service project at the Mahaffie Farmstead last Fall, by overseeing the construction of a corn crib. The project was long awaited, and everything went just as planned due to his fine leadership skills. Zachary will have his Eagle Scout Court of Honor at Mahaffie Farmstead on August 29, 2015.

#### Noah F.

Noah became Troop 86's second deaf scout this year, when he successfully completed his Board of Review on April 9, 2015. Noah's Eagle project was to refurbish and upgrade the main loading dock at Kansas State School for the Deaf. His future plans are to attend the Rochester Institute of Technology in New York, where he will be studying film and animation. Noah had a very inspiring Court of Honor on May 23 at Center of Grace.

#### Matthew T.

Matthew is the most recent Eagle Scout with Troop 86. He completed his Board of Review on April 27. Matthew also completed his Eagle Project at Mahaffie Farmstead late last fall. He oversaw the construction of a sizable cattle shed which will house 3 cattle at the historic site. The shed was built based on farm books from the 1800's, and original buildings during that era. Matthew will also have his Eagle Scout Court of Honor at Mahaffie Farmstead on August 29, 2015.


This year, Troop 86 of Olathe, Kansas commemorated advancing over 200 young men to the rank of Eagle Scout.

Troop 86 is the longest continually running Boy Scout troop in Olathe, receiving its charter in February, 1930.

The first Eagle Scout of Troop 86 was Jimmy Manning, who received his Eagle rank on April 11, 1932. The Eagle Scout Celebration of Troop 86 was held eighty-three years to the day, at Center of Grace United Methodist Church in Olathe, Kansas.

This occasion was not only a chance to congratulate the over 200 Eagle Scouts, but it was also an opportunity to thank the community for supporting this troop for the last eighty-five years. Eagle Scouts must undertake a service project that benefits the community, which involves collaboration between the scouts, their mentors and leaders in the community to formulate a project. There is evidence all around the Olathe area of the impact those service projects have made.

All the Eagle Scouts of Troop 86
were invited to attend. There was a brief
ceremony in the Sanctuary of the church,
followed by a reception. Honored
guests from the Heart of America
Council included, Scout Executive Kenn
Miller, Council Commissioner Keith

# Troop 86 Celebrates Over 200 Eagle Scouts

Michael Copeland. A commemorative patch was designed by one of the current boys in the troop, Life Scout Michael H., which was available to all Eagle Scouts that were at the ceremony. There were also specially designed Eagle Scout neckerchiefs for the Eagle Scouts that have the Troop 86 logo and the words, "Eagle Scout" embroidered on it.

Troop 86 shows no signs of slowing down. It took sixty three years to reach the first One Hundred Eagle Scouts in 1993. It only took twenty two years to pass the second one hundred Eagle Scouts. There is a lot of continuity in this troop. Many adult leaders remain active in mentoring the Scouts, even

after their own

sons have aged out. Several Eagle Scouts and former scouts have come back to the troop with their own sons to experience the Trail to Eagle process. The [previous] Scoutmaster of Troop 86, Rob Norris, is a Troop 86 Eagle Scout; his son earned his Eagle rank three years ago.

Troop 86 would like to thank the Boy Scouts of America, the Heart of America Council, the community of Olathe and surrounding Johnson County area, the adult leaders of Troop 86 and the hard work and dedication of the young men of Troop 86 for making this such a special occasion. 


# National Treasure'ish!




Our adventure seekers endured the 296 steps to reach the summit and claim, "I did
