2012 Adams Eagle Scout Project Award Applications Now Available

The application for the Glenn A. and Melinda W. Adams National Eagle Scout Service Project of the Year Award is now available on the www.NESA.org website. This year marks the third year of the award. In 2010, Eagle Scouts from 35 councils participated. In 2011, 88 councils participated. After all entries are received, the Council-level NESA committee selects their winner. From these, regional committees select their winners and, from those four, the national winner is picked. The nomination procedures, deadlines, and award recognition items are listed on the back side of the application.

Scouts who are interested in working as staff at Day Camps, Wolf / Bear Adventure Camps, Webelos Adventure Camps, or Boy Scout Camps, the application form was emailed by Mr. Avery.

Scout Master Minute

Youth Protection and Safe Haven

In Scouting we say that Boy Scouts is a Safe Haven, but what does that mean? All adults who have contact with youth are required to take Youth Protection Training every two years. Basic tenets of youth protection are two deep leadership and no one on one contact. In BSA privacy is respected and there is no hazing and no bullying.

Two deep leadership on outings protects both the youth and adults in scouting. Two leaders are required on every outing. No one on one contact between youth and adults is allowed either. In vehicles adults are not allowed to drive scouts by themselves but they can be the only adult in the car with multiple scouts. If an adult needs to have a private conversation with a scout that is not their own son, then it must be done in clear view of others.

By extension, it is a good practice for Troop 726 to extend the "No one on one" practice to emails and text messages. When emailing a youth it is a good practice to copy his parent, a scoutmaster, or a committee member. Scouts are advised to do the same when emailing. Texting gets a little more problematic. Sending group texts seems easy enough but responding to all, adding a recipient to a text conversation, and forwarding a text are tasks not as easy done as with email.

Youth protection is part of the broader concept of Scouting as a Safe Haven. We welcome scouts and welcome their ideas. Scouting is for learning. No scout enters the program knowing all the skills in the program and certainly every scout's experience is unique from the collection of outings that he attends to the particular merit badges that he earns. One scout criticizing another scout as stupid is unproductive and guarantees that no solution will come as a result. It is much better to explain and demonstrate the proper way to do something. If a scout is struggling with setting up a tent he is not familiar with, rather than use belittling phrases from afar like, "why don't you know how to set up that tent," it is much more helpful and friendly to go over and ask him what he is struggling with and show him the right way or volunteer to figure it out together

In Troop 726 we have a very respectful practice of youth referring to adults as Mr. and Mrs. and adults referring to other adults as Mr. and Mrs. in the presence of youth. This same respect needs to extend from adults to youth. Ask the boys to complete a task instead of telling them. Reserve all criticism for very serious situations and instead practice encouragement and teaching. Understand that you are dealing with young men and scouting is not a magic bullet that will turn them into an idealized model of a teenager. Understand also that scouting has helped every one of our boys grow into better people and that we have very good boys.

Privacy is respected in scouting. This is privacy of our bodies and our personal possessions. Please ask before using something that belongs to someone else. Taking something from somebody as a prank is often hurtful and disruptive. If you do not know who it belongs to, or if they are absent, then leave it alone. This is also true among patrols on outings. If one patrol brought ketchup and your patrol forgot, then it is courteous to ask, else eat your hot dog topped with scrambled eggs, french fries, and a pop tart on a sesame seed bun with soy sauce only.

Lastly, there is no bullying in scouting, cyberbullying or physical bullying. When does teasing become bullying - when the other person feels bad. Find a way to be kind and cheerful to your fellow scouts.





Philmont Scout Ranch is the Boy Scouts of America's largest national high-adventure base. It covers 137,000 acres - about 214 square miles - of rugged mountain wilderness in the Sangre de Cristo (Blood of Christ) range of the Rocky Mountains in northern New Mexico.

Thirty-four staffed camps and 55 trail camps are operated by the ranch. Philmont has high mountains dominating rough terrain with elevations ranging from 6,500 to 12,441 feet.

Kenji Pinzon, Ryan Flynn, Mitch Avery, and Raymond Akagi will join members of Venture Crew 168 for a 14-day long (July 26 through August 8), fantastic, once-in-a-life time high adventure trip in the sky-high backpacking country. They will get a chance to participate in program features combine the best of the Old West - horseback riding, burro packing, gold panning, chuckwagon dinners, and interpretive history - with exciting challenges for today, such as rock climbing, burro racing, mountain biking, and .30-06 rifle shooting. It's an unbeatable recipe for fast-moving fun and the outdoors.
